# MOUNT NAZARETH LEARNING CENTER RECEIVES ACCOLADES AND GRANTS

Mount Nazareth Learning Center recently achieved the STAR 3 rating from Keystone STARS, a system of continuous quality improvement (CQI) that guides early learning and school-age programs toward achieving and maintaining high quality care and best practices. With additional facility improvements and resource updates underway, MNLC is well on its way to earning the STAR 4 designation.

"Receiving this rating was a result of our staff's hard work and the realization of a long-time goal," said Michelle Harrison, MNLC Director. "Our staff consistently holds 18 college or training credits a year in their fields, and our children have access to the safest and most interactive spaces and curriculum."

Perhaps the most notable recent facility update, made possible by a generous grant from the Grable Foundation, has been the multi-purpose room upgrade. To create a state-of-the-art

space for MNLC students and families, the space received new drywall, paint, and electric work. Outdated radiators were also removed. The space will be used for summer camp, as well as for art, intergenerational activities, science projects, and indoor gross motor fun beginning in the Fall. New computers, books, and science materials are also slated to round out the revamp. Additional grant funding will be used to further improve safety and educational standards such as individual Pre-K lockers. new chairs for the dining room, and online programming training.

In addition to fast-spreading news of the updates and STARS accreditations, Ms. Harrison cites positive word-of-mouth in praise of her staff as why this once little-known childcare facility now has a waiting list—"Our teachers have fantastic reputations," Ms. Harrison explained. "Though we never advertise, I receive calls daily for tours and enrollment inquiries because someone told them to call us first."

# HEROES DAY: MISSION ACCOMPLISHED

Led by Intergenerational Coordinator Sister Antonina Gadacz, Csfn, The Community at Holy Family Manor hosted "Heroes Day" on June 13th to show gratitude and respect to area police, fire, and EMS staff and to teach our children about being heroes in everyday life.

The morning began with a prayer and an enthusiastic rendition of "God Bless America." A dozen heroes were honored by more than 200 children, Manor and Commons residents, CHFM staff, and event volunteers. Excitement was in the air, as were bubbles and familiar smells of a BBQ picnic. Dancing, a hero-themed art contest, and firefighter-themed water play rounded out the schedule. Emergency vehicles were also on site for exploration, including a Quail Volunteer Fire Department truck, Ross Township squad car and motorcycle, and the Ross/West View ambulance. Cesar, the K-9 German Shepherd also made it to the picnic for a few treats.

To show our thanks, each hero was given a giftbag with a prayer card and a caramel candy since they are often in "sticky" situations. Hugs and high-fives were also exchanged. The spirit of our mission of sharing God's love with our extended community was certainly felt that day.



# **SENIOR CARE: BRINGING MEMORIES** TO LIFE

A woman enters a dressing room. She brushes her hand against hats adorned with buttons, feathers, and netting, and decides to try one on. A few doors down a man sits peacefully in a coffee shop. Perry Como plays on the radio. Suddenly for both, 1958 seems like yesterday or maybe even today, and they release sighs of calm content.

A new culture is emerging at Holy Family Manor's Memory Care Unit propelled by the latest cognitive research on life-enriching experiences, and it has been made possible by donations and grants like the \$20,000 PNC Charitable Trust "Bringing Memories to Life" grant received in the Fall of 2016. The specialty unit, which accommodates up to 12 individuals, now offers life skills stations to gently stimulate interests and reconnect residents with their favorite pastimes. These stations include a replica 1950s diner, a handyman's work area equipped with vintage tools and magazines, and a ladies' midcentury dressing room complete with hats, gloves, and costume jewelry. "Residents are able to freely explore and enjoy these spaces. It keeps them engaged while allowing them to feel safe," said Melissa Armienta, Administrator for Holy Family Manor.

Not all stations focus on the 1950s. A popular room is the sensory room, where lights, textures, music, and colors are used to gently soothe and redirect agitated residents. The room amenities keep residents engaged without overwhelming them. Aids help residents manage the sensory controls to fit their individual preferences.

In CHFM's Memory Care Unit, residents not only receive comprehensive care and supervision in a homey environment, but they are also inclined to more frequently reminisce about the "good old days" due to the familiar activities and environments available. This helps to keep them more satisfied and their families comforted.

"Dealing with progressive memory loss is difficult. For the affected it is starting over again new each time, and for the caregiver it is reliving the same thing over and over again," said Ms. Armienta. "Our staff works one-on-one with each resident to learn their history and to familiarize them with the different spaces we've created until they are comfortable enough to experience them independently."

While there is no cure for Alzheimer's and the many related causes of dementia, the Memory Care Unit at Holy Family Manor offers resources and support to help residents and their families through activities that inspire conversation, assist with memory recall, and provide interactive entertainment. >>>










According to the Alzheimer's Association, there are currently more than 5 million Americans struggling with Alzheimer's disease. Unlike other chronic illnesses, Alzheimer's is on the rise and remains the only disease among the top 10 causes of death in America that cannot be prevented, cured or even slowed. The Association asserts that for every person with the disease, it is estimated that an additional three people, most often family, provide support and care. Inspired by this great need and research advancements in memory care, the Community at Holy Family Manor will continue to refine and expand on its specialized program. Ms. Armienta noted, "The improvements already completed, including our movie theater-themed common area, have received really positive responses. The different life stations have opened a whole new world of discovery for our residents."

# **PROGRESS REPORT:** THE CAMPAIGN FOR FAMILIES

Our on-going comprehensive campaign—Campaign for Families: The Heart of Our Mission—was launched three years ago to help continue our mission work. Our fundraising goal of \$1.5 million has been partially realized through efforts like Circle of Friends and The Highmark Walk for a Healthy Community, grants from organizations, and the generosity of independent donors. As our campaign continues, we apply monies received to projects and programs community-wide. Here is a snapshot of a few things we have accomplished so far. ### MOUNT NAZARETH LEARNING CENTER

CHFM has invested \$400,000 to:

Add sinks in 14 classrooms

Install shorter bathroom sinks

Expand and upgrade the dining area

Install tiled areas for art

Remove walls to ensure children's visibility at all times

### NAZARETH HOUSING SERVICES

Annually, an average of 125 seniors and disabled persons in need receive critical home repairs, partially due to our campaign funds.

### **COMMUNITY-WIDE**

A \$50,000 grant from the Pittsburgh Foundation for our Generations Together Intergenerational Program provided new learning materials including technology and grew the program to include residents from The Commons.

Since 2008, she has called on NHS for help with plumbing issues, bathroom safety features, and other modifications to suit her changing mobility needs. With the support of NHS, DeAnne has been able to stay safely and happily in her home for longer than she thought possible. "Nazareth Housing Services was there when nobody else was," DeAnne said to Bill Vandivier, program director. We are part of a network of housing counseling agencies under contract with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, and counseling services are provided to clients free of charge. We participate in the Sustainable Housing Improvement Partnership together with Action-Housing Inc., The Pittsburgh Project, and Rebuilding Together Pittsburgh.
